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INTRODUCTION

The Town of Concord is primarily a rural community that encompasses the Village of Springville, is the southern most town of Erie County, New York. It is located on the North/South Route 219 Expressway corridor. The expressway terminates at Route 39, (east/west) and is a 2 lane highway into the State of Pennsylvania. Residents are within 40 miles commuting distance to the City of buffalo and its suburbs.

There are four (4) fire districts that serve the Town of Concord; Springville (Springville VFD), East Concord (ECVFD), Mortons Corners, (MCVFD) and Boston (BVFD).

There are 2 highway departments; the Village of Springville and the Town of Concord. There is one primary police enforcing agency, The Erie County Sheriff's Department which is under contract with the Village of Springville for police services with secondary help provided by the New York State Police.

It is the intent of this plan to be a reference for personnel of these organizations and a guideline for the handling of hazardous materials incidents. It must be recognized that heavy reliance must be placed on obtaining information from outside sources.

It must also be emphasized that the handling of hazardous materials cannot be paralled to fire fighting operations. Quick aggressive action has no place at a hazardous material incident and will only lead to unnecessary exposure. These incidents will be time consuming and involved. All remediative actions taken must be deliberate and planned after properly researching the materials involved.

Should a hazardous materials emergency exist within the Town of Concord, this plan shall be used in conjunction with the Erie County Hazardous Materials Response Plan and any other plan that may impact the outcome of the incident.

The Town of Concord is in close proximity to the West Valley Demonstration Project located in the Town of Ashford, or about 5 miles south of the Village of Springville. Low level radioactive waste is being mixed and processed into cement drums (canisters) with temporary storage in the on site drum cell until a federal repository has been selected for their permanent storage. High level radioactive waste sludge will be mixed with glass in the vetrification facility. The major waste stream that exists at the West Valley Demonstration Project includes Class A,B, and C low level waste, Transuranic waste, hazardous and mixed waste materials are by product solid wastes form the low level waste treatment facility.

The Nuclear Regulatory Commission has defined these waste streams. Class A waste is being stored in on site storage buildings, Class B & C waste are stored in steel boxes, drums and high integrity containers on site. High level radioactive waste will be vetrified, combined with glass forms, melted to produce borosiliuate glass, the final solidified waste form and poured into stainless steel canisters. The canisters will be stored on site until a federal repository is ready to accept them.

Samples of air, surface water, ground water, soils, plants and animals and personal dosimetry collected is constantly being monitored on site and in surrounding areas. An Emergency Management Plan is in place to meet Dept. of Energy, and NYSERDA order requirements for hazardous substances, tornado and DOE order requirment; A Crisis Management Plan has been implemented.

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Samples of air, surface water, ground water, soils, plants and animals and personnel dosimetry collected is constantly being monitored on site and in surrounding areas. An Emergency Management Plan is in place to meet Dept. of Energy, and NYSERDA order requirements for hazardous substances, tornado and DOE order requirement. A Crisis Management Plan has been implemented.

In the case of hazardous radioactive material incident in the Town of Concord, the Crisis Management Team from the West Valley Demonstration Project and the Erie County Hazardous Materials Response Team and the Southtowns HAZMAT response team located in the Fire Control Center in Hamburg, New York will also be notified for standby emergency medical help.

PURPOSE

This comprehensive hazardous materials response plan for the Town of Concord has been prepared to meet statutory planning requirements of the Occupational Safety and Health Administration 1910.120 (3/6/90) and to provide for a higher degree of preparedness to deal with incidents involving hazardous materials.

This plan provided basic guidelines and establishes responsibility for response to hazardous material incidents in the Town of Concord. The plan is intended for response to a transportation accident or the release of hazardous material at a fixed site.

OBJECTIVES

The objectives of this plan are to:

1. Set forth a course of action which will minimize hazards to life, property, and adverse impacts upon the environment from the release of hazardous material.
2. Establish procedures to provide for a coordinated effort on the part of the Town of Concord and any outside agencies that may respond to such an emergency.
3. Identifies emergency response organizations, equipment and other resources which can be employed during such a response.
4. Provides a mechanism to integrate community response procedures within each other.

This Hazardous Material Response Plan for the Town of Concord is intended to establish procedures in accordance with the Occupational Safety and Health Administration 29 CFR 1910.120 (q)(2.) i thru XII.

1. Pre Planning and Coordination with outside Parties.

This plan, in conjunction with the Erie County Emergency Services, Department of Disaster Preparedness Division, and Southtowns HAZMAT Team provides basic guidelines and establishes responsibilities for response to hazardous materials incidents in the Town of Concord and the Village of Springville.

The Fire Safety Radio Communication Division of the Emergency Services Department and Disaster Preparedness Division is the lead agency in disaster preparedness and is the only organized mutual aid program to be used in Erie County. There are 3 paid fire departments and 94 volunteer individual fire departments in Erie County. The Deputy Commissioner of Erie County Fire Safety (Robert Schultz) is responsible for all hazardous material emergency responses.

Each local department has protective gear, self contained breathing apparatus to handle minor incidents involving hazardous material. Because of large numbers of this type of incident is beyond the capabilities of the local department, The Erie County Emergency Services Response Team and the Southtowns HAZMAT Team were formed and recognized in accordance with General Municipal Law (GML) 209y.

Within the Town of Concord there are four of the previously mentioned fire departments; Springville Volunteer Fire Department, East Concord Volunteer Fire Department, Mortons Corners Volunteer Fire Department and the Boston Volunteer Fire Department. The objectives of the Erie County Hazardous Materials Response Plan is to establish procedures to provide a coordinated effort on the part of the Erie County Fire Safety Division and the Southtowns HAZMAT Team, located in Hamburg Fire Control Center using their established mutual aid plan (in accordance with GML 204F) in response to a hazardous material emergency.

In the event that such an incident should grow to the magnitude to exceed the resources of the Erie County Emergency Services Plan of Deputy Commissioner of Erie County Fire Safety acting as Regional Fire Administrator and Southtowns HAZMAT Team will require the State of New York Fire Mobilization and Mutual Aid Plan be implemented in accordance with GML209e.

All four fire departments and the two highway departments and the Sheriffs' department have radio communications capabilities with the Springville control Center and Southtowns HAZMAT Team Control Center located in Hamburg, New York. Upon notification of a hazardous materials incident in the Town of Concord, the Control center will proceed as in accordance with Page 4 of the Erie County Hazardous Material Response Plan listed under notification and alerting of HAZMAT incident.

The Erie County Sheriff's Department, The Town of Concord Highway Department, and the Village of Springville Highway Department will perform pursuant to provision of 29 CFR - 1910.120 (q) (6) (i). The Fire Departments will perform their duties pursuant to provision of 29 CFR 1910.120 (q) (6) (ii).

II. Personnel roles, lines of authority, training and communications.

Upon notification of a hazardous material emergency, the ranking officer of the Fire Department with local jurisdiction and authority is the on scene commander. As such he will assess the emergency situation and, if appropriate, establish a command post. He should declare a response level according to the response criteria listed in Page 7 of the Erie County Hazardous Material Response Plan. The responsibilities thereafter will be pursuant to Page 7 of the Erie County Hazardous Material Response Plan, depending on the level of incident.*

In the event of a "crime associated" hazardous material emergency, the Erie County Sheriff's Department will participate in a joint command operation, along with the NYS Police, with their sub station located in Boston, New York.

All communications will be coordinated through the Southtowns HAZMAT Center located in Hamburg, New York, Telephone 648-5111 or 46.20 MHZ and Medical Emergency Response Radio System (MERRS) 898-3696.

Directions and control begins with the local response but is expanded as the emergency escalates to a larger response directed by the county or possibly the state.

Local participating agencies depending on the circumstances may also include

- a) Mayor/Supervisor
- b) Highway Department
- c) Volunteer groups
- d) Bertrand Chaffee Hospital

The Fire Department Staff are to be trained to function at the operations level (29 CFR 1910.120, q., 6., ii.) The police and highway staff are to be trained to respond at the awareness level (20 cfr 1910.120 q.,6.,i.)

III. Emergency recognition and prevention.

Responders other than the fire department should immediately notify the Erie County Control and Southtowns HAZMAT Team and the Springville control Center of the location along with any other available/pertinent information in order that the appropriate fire department may be activated to respond. Such responders will attempt to determine, from a safe distance, what material is involved by interpreting placard ID numbers, shipping papers, witness/driver interviews, etc. The US Department of Transportation Guidebook (DOT P5800.5) is an excellent reference and should be carried in each Erie County Sheriff's patrol vehicle, as well as issued to each highway department (Springville and Concord) and each fire department (Springville, East Concord, Mortons Corners and Boston).

RESPONSE TO A SUSPECTED HAZARDOUS MATERIALS INCIDENT.

- 1. Advise the Erie County Control
- 2. Southtowns HAZMAT Team
- 3. Springville Control Center

(Erie County control is Medical Emergency Radio Response System - MERRS - phone 898 3696 located in the Erie County Medical Center in Buffalo, New York.

Southtowns HAZMAT Team located in Hamburg and dispatched from Hamburg Fire Control - 648-5111 - 46.20 MHZ.

Springville Control Center - 911 or 592-9323 or 46.32 MHZ located on Franklin Street Sheriff's sub station.

- 2) Note any weather conditions and make special note of the wind direction - STAY UPWIND. (If radioactive waste is involved notify the West Valley Demonstration Project HAZMAT TEAM also.
- 3) Stop and park far enough away from the incident site so as not to introduce an ignition source.
- 4) Move people away from the incident scene and keep them away. Rope off a large area if necessary.
- 5) Do not walk into or through any spilled material.
- 6) Avoid inhaling fumes, smoke and vapors.
- 7) Do not assume that gases or vapors are harmless because of lack of smell.

Police will:

- a) secure the area and set up an outer perimeter and isolate the hazard area supplying traffic control and support personnel.

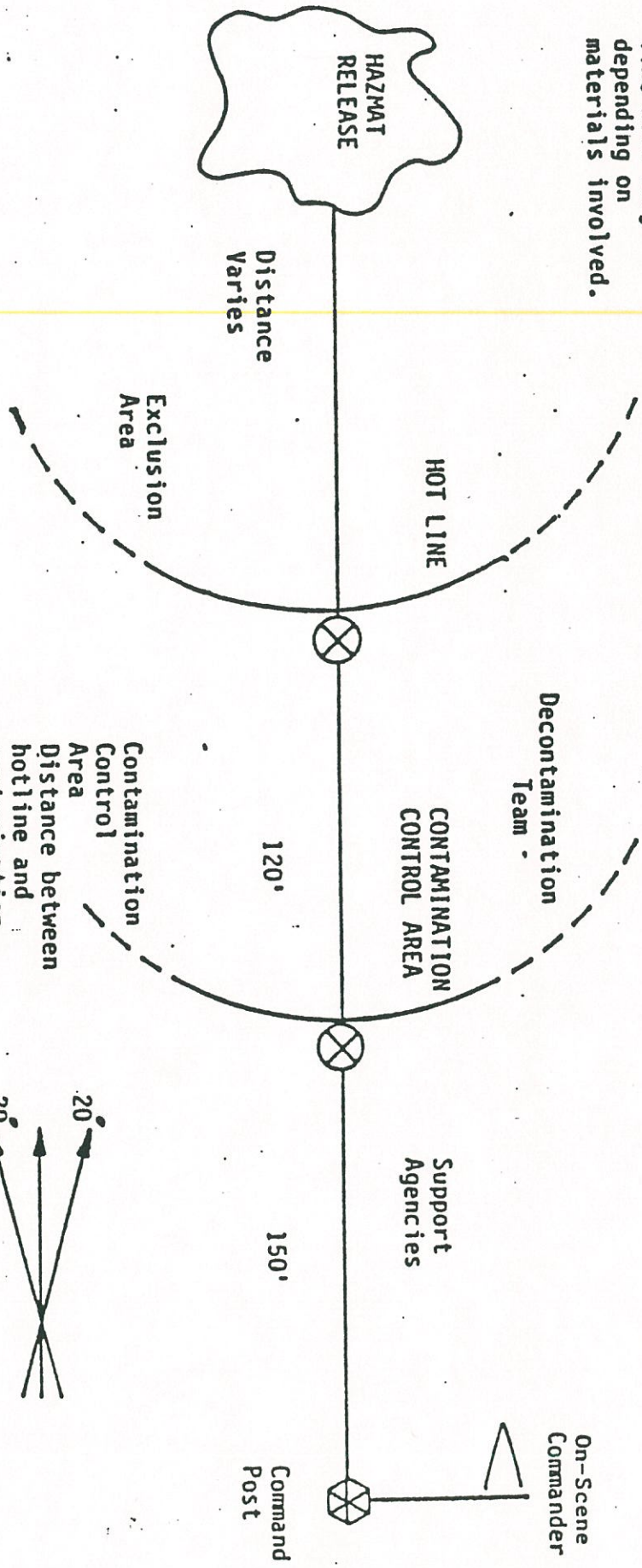
- b) Assist in evacuation of the site, if requested to do so by the site commander.

The Fire department will:

- a) Establish an inner perimeter. This area should be observed by all personnel until a tailored plan has been established.
- b) Identify the material or materials involved.
- c) Establish an incident command structure and relay the location to County Control, Springville control and the Southtowns HAZMAT office.
- d) Determine a response level for this incident (pursuant to guidelines as set forth in the Erie County Hazardous Materials Response Plan and follow the procedures as they are outlined.

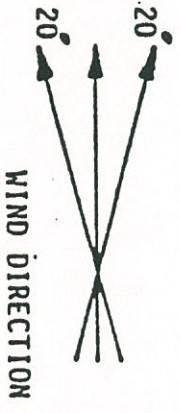
SCENE ORGANIZATION PLAN OVERVIEW

Distance between release and hotline will vary depending on materials involved.



Distance between hotline and contamination control line to be at least 120' depending on the severity of the incident, the materials involved, and the scene characteristics.

Distance between operations area and command post to be at least 150' depending on the severity of the incident, the materials involved, and the scene characteristics.



IV. SAFE DISTANCES AND PLACES OF REFUGE.

It will be determined by the incident commander. Each incident will be evaluated upon its location and circumstances. The scene organization plan as demonstrated in the Erie County Hazardous Material Response Plan will serve as a guide for this plan also.

Places of refuge will also be determined by the location and magnitude of the incident and may include facilities such as:

- 1) Village of Springville Fire Hall located on West Main St.
- 2) Village of Springville Fire Hall located on Franklin St.
- 3) Town Hall of the Town of Concord
- 4) Mortons Corners Fire Hall
- 5) East Concord Fire Hall
- 6) Springville Griffith Institute Elementary Building
- 7) Springville Griffith Institute Middle School Building
- 8) Springville Griffith Institute High School Building
- 9) Msgr. Zimmerman Parish Hall
- 10) Bertrand Chaffee Hospital
- 11) Town of Boston Fire Hall

The determination of a need for notification/evacuation/sheltering will be by the incident commander. Support will be provided by the Erie County Sheriff's Department, NYS Police, Erie County Emergency Response Team, Southtowns HAZMAT Team, Red Cross and Auxiliary units of the aforementioned fire departments.

V. SITE SECURITY AND CONTROL

Will be designated by the incident commander and enforced by the Erie County Sheriff's Department.

VI. EVACUATION ROUTES AND PROCEDURES.

Will be determined by the incident commander. Each incident will be evaluated based upon its location and circumstance. The appropriate shelter will be designated, notification will be both door to door and emergency vehicle PA systems. Persons needing shelter will be directed or transported (if necessary) to the designated shelter.

Supports will be provided by the Erie County Sheriff's Department and the Erie County Emergency Response Team, South-towns HAZMAT Team as well as the American Red Cross and fire department auxiliaries.

VIII. EMERGENCY MEDICAL TREATMENT AND FIRST AID.

Emergency medical treatment and first aid will be at the direction of the incident commander and provided as needed, pursuant to procedures as outlined within the Erie county Hazardous Materials Response Plan.

VII. DECONTAMINATION.

Decontamination will be at the direction of the incident commander, and will be accomplished utilizing procedures as outlined with the Erie County Hazardous Materials Response Plan.

Special notice should also be given to the West Valley Demonstration Project Emergency Team to aid in coordinating a decontamination team.

IX. EMERGENCY ALERTING AND RESPONSE PROCEDURES.

A hazmat declaration by the incident commander will require him to determine the response level, based on the criteria as outlined in the Erie County Hazardous Materials Response Plan. The incident commander will direct the County Control to notify those people and agencies as he deems necessary to respond to the incident.

Alert will be done either by activation of the Emergency Broadcast Network or by calling the television and radio stations to request their assistance.

The primary means of alerting will be to utilize the PA systems on the police and fire vehicles. The procedure will be a five second siren, followed by the announcement, twice. The unit will continue on and follow the same steps at approximately 250' from the prior stop. Notification may also be made by going door to door.

X. CRITIQUE OF THE RESPONSE AND FOLLOW UP.

At a time agreed upon by the incident commander and the lead persons of each agency responding to an incident there will be a critique of the event to discuss how to respond to similar incidents more safely and efficiently through the experience gained from the incident being addressed. This critique will also address how to present the current incident and any details that may need to be followed up.

XI. PPE AND EMERGENCY EQUIPMENT

The Police Department will respond pursuant to 29 CFR 1910.120 (q) (6) (i). They will have no personal protection equipment (PPE). They will have mobile and portable radio communications equipment, marked and unmarked patrol units, barrier tape, etc.

The Highway Departments will respond pursuant to 29 CFR 1910.120 (q) (6) (i). They will have no personal protection equipment. They will be utilized as support as requested by the incident commander.

The Fire Departments will respond pursuant to 29CFR 1910.120 (q) (6) (ii). They will have personal protection equipment (PPE) and be trained as outlined in the aforementioned regulation.

XII. EMERGENCY RESPONSE

The Town of Concord (including the Village of Springville) recognizes the Erie County Hazardous Materials Response Plan as the primary source for implementing a response to such an emergency. The Town of Concord Hazardous Materials REsponse Plan is designed to operate in conjunction with and a part of the overall County Plan.

ADDENDUM # I

1. OBJECTIVE

ADDENDUM # 2

5. The DOT Emergency Response Guidebook is carried in all apparatus and will be used as a guideline until the Southtowns HAZMAT Team arrives.

5. The DOT Emergency Response Guidebook is carried in all apparatus and will be used as a guideline until the Southtowns HAZMAT Team arrives.

IV. ERIE COUNTY HAZARDOUS MATERIALS RESPONSE TEAM.

Upon arrival of the Southtowns HAZMAT Team the ERIE COUNTY HAZARDOUS MATERIALS RESPONSE PLAN will be in effect and will be adhered to.
